Directions: At the intersection of Rochester and Sewickley Oakmont Roads (Sir Pizza), turn left onto Rochester Rd. Just past the Rochester Inn keep right and continue for about 2 miles. You will have gone through the light at Mt. Nebo Pointe (Mt. Nebo Rd, Target), and the light at the ramps for I 279, (You can also come north on I 279 from the city and take the Camp Horne Exit - continue with the following directions). At the next set of lights, turn left onto Gass Road, go past the Home Depot and Giant Eagle, and turn right onto Ben Avon Heights Rd. Go to the top of the hill and at the stop sign turn left onto New Brighton Rd. There is a green Shannopin sign and arrow. At the next stop sign, about 0.1 mile, turn left onto Canterbury Rd. It is 0.1 miles to Shannopin. Continue to the portico for valet parking or make a **left** into the upper parking lot to park yourself. There is a short set of stairs that will take you to the entrance.
