STEM Education Update

We are happy to report the outcome of our first of two STEM programs for this fiscal year. We had to get creative given the restrictions from the CDC regarding COVID 19. This program exemplifies collaboration with three organizations – AAUW North Hills, STEMsteps and Skype A Scientist.



STEMsteps is a 501(c) 3 non-profit preschool and kindergarten dedicated to improving children's lives by providing highly engaging, whole-child centered, STEM-based curriculum for young children. STEMsteps curriculum is designed by practicing teachers and combines traditional subject areas such as language, literacy, art, music, science, and math with technological-driven and inquiry-based methods cultivating curious, flexible, persistent, and collaborative thinkers. After seeing the need for schools to be more hands on Gabrielle Palermo and Heather Tetmyer co-founded STEMsteps in 2015.

Professor Sara McAnulty is founder and executive director Skype A Scientist, a non-profit organization that connects scientists, teacher, parents and students and groups around the world for live video calls. Dr. McAnulty is an AAUW American Fellowship alumna.

Message from STEMsteps ~ thanks to AAUW for sponsoring Skype a Scientist for our Kindergarten/K- Prep students! The Skype was with Emily who is an Animal Scientist, focusing on Baboons in Africa. They had so much fun learning all about their lifestyle and habitat. The students asked very inquisitive questions and the scientist was quite impressed! After our Skype a Scientist program the students went on a safari animal hunt outside. They had to check off each camouflaged animal that they found. ALL AAUW North Hills Pittsburgh Branch members will receive an email from National, subject – **AAUW Membership Renewal Notice** that will instruct you on how to renew your membership and pay your dues online. Again, we ask you to **please utilize this feature** as so many of you have done in the past. It is easy and safe.

<u>Please note:</u> The National Membership portion of dues is being increased! The dues will increase by \$3 for FY 2022, \$5 for FY 2023, and \$5 for FY 2024 making the amount \$62, \$67, and \$72, respectively.

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2021-2022: $103 Dues = $62 National + $10 State + $31 Branch 2022-2023: $108 Dues = $67 National + $10 State + $31 Branch 2023-2024: $113 Dues = $72 National + $10 State + $31 Branch

If you pay dues by May 1st, you will receive two chances; by May 15th, one chance!



COVID Update

Millions of Americans have received the vaccines and are now considered fully vaccinated. But guidelines still call for all Americans to stay cautious and take preventive measures, like mask-wearing, hand washing, and social distancing. As more people become fully vaccinated, they can — in certain situations — gather without masks.



What Does Fully Vaccinated Mean?

<u>According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u>, you are considered fully vaccinated if:

- At least two weeks have passed since you received the second dose of the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine
- At least two weeks have passed since you received the single dose of the J&J vaccine

If less than two weeks have passed since your final dose, or you have received only one dose of the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine, **you are not fully vaccinated**. You should continue to follow all preventive measures to protect against COVID-19 spread.

What Should I Do After Being Fully Vaccinated?

You should continue to follow COVID-19 prevention efforts in most situations after being fully vaccinated. This includes wearing a mask, social distancing, practicing good hand hygiene, and avoiding crowds. The CDC also recommends delaying both domestic and international travel.

You should continue to follow any federal, state, and local guidelines about mask-wearing or other protective efforts. You should also stay aware of COVID-19 symptoms, especially if you've been around someone who is sick.

Do I Have to Wear a Mask After I've Been Fully Vaccinated?

In most situations, you should continue to wear a mask.

Masks have shown effectiveness in preventing COVID-19 spread. They offer a layer of protection to you and the people around you.

<u>CDC guidelines</u> suggest two specific situations where people may skip masking and distancing indoors:

- If a fully vaccinated household visits another fully vaccinated household in their own home
- If a fully vaccinated household visits a household that is not fully vaccinated, as long no one in that household is at high risk of developing COVID-19 complications

It remains important to mask and distance any time you are with others who are not part of your household. To protect those who are vulnerable, wear a mask:

- In public
- When you are with an unvaccinated person at high risk of complications
- When gathering with unvaccinated people from multiple households or in medium- or largesize gatherings.

If you start to experience COVID-19 symptoms, you should quarantine and call your doctor — even if you have been vaccinated.
